Dissertation: “The Institutional Transformation of Africa’s Personalist Regimes: A Comparative Analysis of Ethiopia, Ghana, Rwanda, and Uganda”

This comparative study of political development in contemporary Africa analyzed the role of coalition politics in the institutionalization of power and authority. It identified conditions under which personalist regimes transition either to democratic or to authoritarian institutional paths, and develop (or fail to develop) the autonomy of state agencies to undertake transformative projects. The dissertation utilized in-case and cross-case comparisons based on extensive and original research in Ethiopia, Ghana, Rwanda, and Uganda.
